REVISE THIS **TOPIC**

The race times, x, to the nearest minute, of the first 10 finishers in the London marathon are shown.

124 124 127 127 128 129 130 130 131 131

The data is coded using the formula $y = \frac{x - 120}{4}$

(a) Work out the coded value for the runner who finished in 3rd place. **(1)**

One of the coded race times is 2.5 minutes.

(b) Work out the original race time for this coded value. **(1)**

 $\sigma_r = 2.468$ (to 3 decimal places). $\bar{x} = 128.1$

(2) (c) Using these values, or otherwise, work out the mean (\bar{y}) and standard deviation (σ_{v}) of the coded values.

127 - 120 = 1.75 (c) $\overline{y} = \overline{x} - 120$

x - 120 = 2.5= 2.025

x - 120 = 10

x = 130

= 2.468

= 0.617

(a) Work out the mean (\bar{h}) and standard deviation (σ_h)

The data is coded using the formula c = h - 165

(b) Work out the mean (\bar{c}) and standard deviation (σ_c) for the coded values. (2)

The data is coded using the formula $y = \frac{x}{5} - 100$

(b) Work out the mean (\bar{y}) and standard deviation (σ_y) for the coded values. (2)

$$\sum y = 210$$
 $\sum (y - \bar{y})^2 = 172$

(a) Work out the mean daily temperature for the 30 days.

- (b) Work out standard deviation of the daily temperatures for the 30 days.

5 Jim cycles at least 100 km each day for 20 consecutive days. Jim records his daily distance cycled, x, to the nearest km for each of the 20 days.

Jim wants to convert the data from kilometres to miles.

He codes the data using the formula $m = \frac{x}{1.6}$, where the units of m are miles.

$$\sum m = 1300$$
 $\sum m^2 = 84550$

(a) Work out the mean daily distance cycled, in ${\bf km}$, for the 20 days.

- (b) Work out standard deviation of the daily distance cycled, in **km**, for the 20 days.

$$\sigma_m = \frac{84\ 550\ -65^2}{20}$$

$$\frac{o_m = o_x}{1.6}$$

$$\overline{m} = \overline{x}$$

$$\sigma_m = 1.58..$$

$$65 = \bar{x}$$

$$\sigma_x = 1.58... \times 1.6$$

6 The weekly wages, w, to the nearest pound, are recorded for 6 employees at a company.

The data is coded using the formula $x = \frac{w - 800}{5}$

$$\sum x = 66 \qquad \qquad \sum x^2 = 4356$$

- (a) Work out the mean weekly wage, in pounds, of the 6 employees.
- (b) Work out, to the nearest pound, the standard deviation of the weekly wages of the 6 employees. (3)

- (b) Work out the standard deviation, in grams, of the masses of the ten 1p coins (3)

 (b) $\sigma_x = 17284 = 41.574...$

$$\overline{x} = 1000\overline{m} - 3500$$
 $\sigma_x = 1000\sigma_m$

$$64 = 1000\overline{m} - 3500$$
 $41.574... = 1000\sigma_m$

$$3564 = 1000\overline{m}$$
 $\sigma_m = 0.041574 \text{ g}$

$$\overline{m} = 3.564 \text{ g}$$
